From the Rev. Claire Kiddy:

February can seem a month caught between the seasons – Christmas is packed away yet still the days are short and wintry, but if we look closely, we notice the light lingering a little bit longer each day. We see signs of hope, bulbs are beginning to push through the cold ground and snowdrops appear, almost unnoticed at first.

In the church calendar, February brings us Candlemas, the feast that marks the presentation of Jesus in the Temple. It's a moment that can easily be overlooked, but it holds something deeply precious. Simeon and Anna are two elderly figures who have waited faithfully for years and finally they see what they have long hoped for: the light of God coming into the world.

Light is a powerful image at this time of the year. We are all weary of darkness by February...dark mornings, dark evenings and sometimes dark news that weighs heavily on our hearts, yet Candlemas reminds us that God's light does not wait for perfect conditions. It shines into ordinary, imperfect, even difficult circumstances. February is also a month when we're invited to pause and reflect. Before we step into spring, Lent calls us to reflect once again on Jesus's journey to the Cross...there's time to ask ourselves simple but important questions.... Where have I noticed light recently? Who has helped me see hope when I struggled to find it myself? How might I be a small bearer of that light to others?

In our villages light often shows itself in very practical ways: neighbours check in on one another, meals are shared, lifts offered, conversation flows over a cup of tea or over the garden fence. These moments matter more that we sometimes realise. They are reflections of God's care, lived out in everyday faithfulness.

As we move through February and into March may the signs of spring fill our hearts with hope and our eyes be focussed on the light of God's love already at work in our communities.

Spring is a season which propels us forward as green shoots appear. Popular terms come to mind – 'spring forward' 'spring in my step'. Where will these new signs of life take you to this year? *Revd Claire*

REPORTS OF CHRISTMAS EVENTS IN SWEFFLING:



CHRISTMAS BRUNCH AND MARKET: On November 29th, the Village Hall was full with people enjoying delicious bacon (and egg) rolls and freshly brewed tea and coffee. Stalls were busy, and we are very grateful to all those who made, wrapped, baked, cooked and generally contributed in so many ways. We have to say a special thank you to Ladybird nurseries who generously donated pansy and wallflower plants to the plant stall. Thank you to everyone who manned stalls, spent the morning in the kitchen and to those who came and supported this very successful event, which raised £806 for church funds.

Ipswich Outreach: Lyz Frankin has sent the following report: I would like to thank the organisers of the Christmas Brunch and Market held in the Hut on 29th November, and everyone who supported my stall. A total of £70.15 was taken in sales on the day, plus a generous donation of £40. During the year a further £109.85 was raised from sales of my surplus garden produce and various donations. The total amount sent was £220. In November 2024 Ipswich Outreach was awarded The King's Award for Voluntary Service which was presented to the charity on 14th June 2025.

Ipswich Outreach is a charity which helps the homeless and those in need in Ipswich by running a nightly Soup Kitchen providing food and items of clothing, bedding and toiletries. The charity has a purpose-built bus complete with serving facilities, seating, storage and two treatment rooms which are used by other agencies to provide support and advice to those in need.

CHRISTMAS BRASS CONCERT: Having to cancel the concert in 2024 due to severe weather conditions, it was great to welcome the Leiston Royal British Legion Brass Band to Sweffling Church on December 12th 2025. The theme was entirely Christmas and the audience enjoyed an eclectic programme of popular Christmas music and carols, expertly played by the band. The programme was enhanced by the narrative between the musical items, which set the pieces into context. Overheard was the comment "It was the best concert yet!" Delicious mince pies and tea/coffee were enjoyed in the interval and there was a Christmas Raffle. Many thanks to the Band, who turned out in force, to the mince-pie and tea and coffee makers, to those who donated raffle prizes, to the local businesses who advertised in the programme and to those who supported the concert. If you couldn't be there, you missed an excellent and enjoyable evening. Make sure you are there this year! Proceeds will be donated to St. Mary's Church.

On Saturday, February 7th, in Sweffling Hut, commencing at 11.00.a.m., there will be a training session on the use of the defibrillator, which is situated outside by the steps to the Hut This will be conducted by St. John's Ambulance trainers and is free to all participants, no age limit. CPD will also be included. It is in all our interests to learn how to use this equipment. In the case of an emergency it could be life-saving. **Please ensure you attend.**

NATURE NOTES February – March 2026:

Just before we left Sweffling I spent a short time outside the house after dark, noticing the sounds which have been such a big part of our winter environment. The Tawny Owls, as



always, were very noisy, with their familiar hooting call that we have talked about so often. One, in the large Oak tree in next door's drive, was particularly loud – we will certainly miss him! Tawny Owls are particularly strict about maintaining their territories from year to year, even in the winter. As nocturnal hunters, they need to learn



to use their woodland homes very efficiently to survive and to raise a brood. Our local Little Owl, who has become so familiar this autumn, was also very vocal with his sharp 'yapping' noise.

Across the valley, in Dodd's wood, there is every winter an enormous gathering of crows, specifically of Jackdaws and Rooks. which assemble there to roost for the night. How they get any sleep I don't know – they seem to be making a racket for much of the night, which



we could always hear when the wind was right. One winter I counted the Jackdaws as they gathered at dusk in a nearby field, and there were at least 1,500, with approximately as many Rooks! There are nowhere near that many Jackdaws in this bit of the valley, and they must gather from quite a wide area. Rooks use the roost only in mid-winter, as a superflock, after which they start using their traditional rookeries as roosts in their local groups. In fact, Rooks nest very early in the spring. In Rendham,

(and a small rookery near the bridge in Sweffling), you will see them quite soon bringing in twigs to repair their nests.

It is a bit premature to tell you about the birds in our new Framlingham town garden, but we have set up bird feeders and will send records to the RSPB bird count at the end of January. I hope that there will be House Sparrows, which I like, and Starlings which we lost in our Sweffling garden several years ago. More about these another time. But you can guess that we have a number of pigeons. Despite a complete lack of trees for shelter and nesting in this small town garden, there are a few Collared Doves, which wake us up as always with their three-note cooing. Wood Pigeons too are surprisingly tame, as they often are in towns. The earlier books I remember often referred to Wood Pigeons as 'Ring Doves' after the white markings on their necks, but this is hardly a ring, and as there is now another species called Collared Dove in our fauna, I am not sorry to see this old name go. More useful in identifying Wood Pigeons is the large white crescent on the wings. In flight, this white wing mark shows clearly from several fields away, and distinguishes the Wood Pigeon from any other bird. In particular, it helps to distinguish this pigeon from its cousin, the

Stock Dove, a farmland bird which is common enough in the Alde Valley although often overlooked, but which I do not expect to see in Framlingham. This is, I think, an attractive bird, a pretty blue-grey, with the wings in flight showing plain grey panels and with a darker border. In the Alde Valley they nest in holes in trees or in barns, as well as in owl nesting



boxes. Finally, in 'identification by numbers', all three pigeons can be distinguished by the number of 'coos' in their song. Collared Doves make three coos, Stock Doves only two, and Wood Pigeons, count them, five. *Geoffrey Abbott*

SWEFFLING CONSERVATION STEWARDS

An informal group called Sweffling Conservation Stewards was formed on 3rd January with the aims "Enhancing the value of Sweffling community spaces for wildlife and people while fostering a community spirit and co-operation with existing village organisations". The group is now listed under the Organisations tab on the village web site. Although the aims

may sound very grand, the emphasis is on "informal and friendly". Whether you have gardening skills, enjoy conservation work, or simply want to meet neighbours while doing something positive, there's a role for you. All ages welcomed including accompanied young children and older children working towards an award such as a DofE Award. Geoffrey Abbott is well known to readers through his wonderful Nature Notes in The Bridge, and, in spite of being very busy, he and Jill came to meet with us on 3rd January so that we could benefit from his wise guidance. We will work alongside existing village groups and have begun working in the old churchyard, Memorial Garden, Townland Trust Meadow and Jubilee Field and will be looking at protecting the areas of species-rich roadside verges. We have received a very generous donation of Sweffling-made bird and bat boxes and you may spot Julian up a ladder installing these at various locations including close to Sweffling Hut. Please do get in touch to receive details of working parties, survey days and other information. However able, or not, you are, please join us for working party tea and cake and chat and offer helpful comments! REPAIRS TO THE CHURCH ROOF

There is an ongoing problem of rainwater leaking into the church, where the roof abuts onto the church tower. This is causing damage to the ceiling in the southwest corner of the body of the church. The Churchwardens and PCC have approved a major repair to the church roof/tower abutment, and the necessary List B approval has been obtained from the Diocese for the work to go ahead. This will require scaffolding to be erected and specialist roofing contractors have been appointed to carry out the necessary roof and leadwork. The proceeds donated to the church from the 2025 fete will be deployed to help offset the cost of these repairs, which could be in the region of £10,000, depending upon what the roofers uncover when they start work. When the external repair work has been completed it will be necessary to carry out internal repairs to the ceiling, yet to be approved and costed.

SWEFFLING COMMUNITY PUB UPDATE

We're very happy to say that the festive period was a success, thank you all for coming and joining us! It's been wonderful to see the pub so busy and we're grateful to have received some lovely comments and feedback via the new Suggestions box in the pub.

Main Share Offer update

We have been invited to proceed to full application for the Community Shares Standard Mark which provides a third party audit of our business plans and financial projections and may open up additional funding sources for us. Work will continue through January on this application and we expect a decision by the end of February if documentation gets to them in a timely manner. This will be the Committee's primary focus this month. We therefore expect the full share prospectus for the main pub purchase to be complete at the end of February, and our main Share Offer will likely run from the end of February until early December.

Loyalty Cards

Loyalty Cards are back! These will be available to shareholders only, and as per the previous scheme, will provide one free Pint or equivalent for 20 stamps. We have taken the old cards down to make room, if you would like yours for posterity, please ask one of the bar staff.
